We share these special places with loved ones; where we played together in the park downtown, the bookstore we frequented on the weekends, the cozy coffee shops where we would catch up.

But life gets busy, and it's not always easy to visit those loved ones and see their day-to-day worlds. What buildings do they walk past on the way to work? Which cafes do they enjoy on lazy Sunday mornings? What are their happy places?





## How it all began

A few months ago, my childhood best friend bought me a set of Strathmore watercolor postcards. We grew up going to art classes together, but in adulthood, began to drift apart after moving to opposite coasts. As soon as I got her gift in the mail, I started to brainstorm about what kind of postcard I could send to her. A seasonal card? A cute cartoon? I thought about drawing her house, as a belated housewarming gift. I had never been there before, so I looked up her address on Google Maps, hoping for a charming little Brooklyn brownstone, like in the movies. It was a high rise condo.

So instead, I decided to find a random building in Brooklyn, near her home, and make the postcard into a scavenger hunt! I had so much fun virtually exploring her neighborhood, as I looked for the perfect location. I painted that building, added some hints in the postcard to help her find the secret spot, and sent it off!

I was really excited about this idea and started sending scavenger hunt postcards to some other friends and family. It became such a nice way to keep in touch, and it almost felt as though I could explore their city with them, even from hundreds of miles



away. Digitally poking around their towns satisfied the curiosity we all feel about our long-distance loved ones. When they walk down the street every day, what is there to see? Where is there to go?

I had found a way to recreate the feeling of visiting a friend, as they show you around their new city and take you to all of their favorite hidden gems around town. Their happy places!









# The process

When creating these scavenger hunts, I make sure to start in a location they know, such as their house or a well-known park.

Then, I look for interesting places nearby. I love searching for the cutest coffee shops, quirkiest diners anything that would be fun for them to visit (and fun for me to paint!). Then,

using Strathmore Blank Watercolor Postcards, I paint that location, decide on a route, and add hints to guide them along on their hometown adventure!

As much as I love planning out the scavenger hunts, I enjoy the postcard painting process the most. There are so many beautiful architectural styles, each presenting unique challenges when brush meets paper. With time, I narrowed in on a painting style that I hoped would capture the essence and charm of each location: immediately recognizable, but leaving some room for whimsy.



After posting about my scavenger hunt postcards on my Tiktok account, more and more people began to express interest in




painting style that I hoped would capture the essence and charm of each location: immediately recognizable, but leaving some room for whimsy.



commissions. I soon started to sell custom postcards on Etsy. I offered a variety of customizations: most importantly, you could either pick the scavenger hunt location

yourself, or, you could pick a city and ask me to surprise you!

With time, I noticed that some people were using them in a variety of ways that I didn't expect. Some would order a scavenger hunt postcard for themselves, choosing "surprise me" as the destination, as a way to explore somewhere new in their own town. Or they'd send postcards to their friends who just moved, to help them find their bearings in their new city. I've even had people send scavenger hunt postcards to a local friend or spouse, to enjoy together as a fun weekend activity or date night!



















## Growing beyond postcards

As I painted more and more commissions, I made sure to keep in contact with people who had ordered postcards. I soon realized that although they loved the scavenger hunts, many people really just wanted art of sentimental locations. Childhood homes, favorite cafes, wedding venues, places like that.

So, I began offering paintings for custom buildings. Many orders would include the heartwarming stories behind why they commissioned a particular location. A couple's first apartment, with their cat sitting in her favorite spot in the window. The concert venue a girl went to with her sister for many, many years. The ivy growing on an old home, removed by new owners but now lovingly preserved in watercolor. In a time when the world can feel increasingly distant and digital, it's especially important to hold on to the people - and places - that make you feel connected. I'm so grateful to have found a small way to share the gift of connection with others and feel incredibly excited for what's to come!

The colorful beetle was a good example of the biodiversity that the forest supports - from stands of looming old growth trees to the smallest beetle.












# ALL ABOUT WATERCOLOR GRANULATION

# What is granulation?


Granulation is an interesting characteristic of watercolor that causes the paint layer to look textured or mottled. This textured appearance is caused by pigment particles clustering together rather than staying evenly dispersed within the layer of watercolor paint. This clustering creates areas of darker color (where the pigment is dense) and areas of lighter color (where the pigment is sparse.)






