Gouache and Toned Paper: A Perfect Match

There is something about gouache paint that just captivates me. The matte finish and the vibrancy of the colors is so beautiful, making me want to capture everything around me in my sketchbook with gouache. I started using gouache paint a couple of years ago when I began to reconnect with art more seriously after years of leaving my creativity to the side. Although I love using lots of other mediums,

gouache will always have a special place for me because it was the medium I first truly clicked with after I began to warm up to art making again. It has been through my love for gouache that I was able to grow my social media platforms, start a YouTube channel, and eventually decide to turn art into something a bit more serious than just a side hobby.



There are a few features that I love about gouache. I find that the way gouache reactivates with water is so useful, even though it's one of the things that many warn about as a negative of gouache paint! But I love the way I can blend on the page, or reactivate the paint if I make a mistake with it- it's such a forgiving medium. I find that layering the paint, from thin layers to thicker layers, allows me to achieve so much depth. This has helped me refine my own preferred process when painting with gouache, which involves building up multiple layers. This layering approach with gouache has impacted the way I see things around me. Sometimes I find myself looking at a tree, or a fruit bowl, or a bench in the sunlight, and I think about how I would paint it with gouache; picking the colors of my first layers and going through the order of the different layers of paint I would put down. I also love how if I leave my palette with paint to dry, I can pick it up the next day and reactivate the paints with water and use them again. So overall, I can say that it was love at first try between me and gouache, and I love showing how it can be such a perfect beginners' medium when you are starting to learn how to paint.

On my gouache journey, I have tried many different sketchbooks and papers, and one of my favorite papers for gouache has to be Strathmore Toned Mixed Media paper. Toned paper is the perfect pairing for gouache paint. The way the vibrant paint jumps off the

page when put against the toned tan or gray paper is so satisfying. I also find that painting on toned paper really elevates sketchbook work. I think it provides a lovely mid-tone that can tie a whole spread of sketches and studies together. It also somehow reduces that “blank page” fear that I can get when I'm starting a sketch or painting on white paper! I have loved using my Strathmore Toned Mixed Media Art Journals and paper in various tones, including tan, gray, blue, and more recently black.



When I first saw the Black Mixed Media paper, I was super intrigued. I wanted to know if gouache paint would keep its vibrancy, and whether it would create that same 'jumping off the page' effect that I found on the other toned paper. And the answer is yes! Not only does gouache look just as vibrant on black paper, but it also gave me new ideas of what to paint.

3 THEMES THAT ARE PERFECT FOR BLACK PAPER

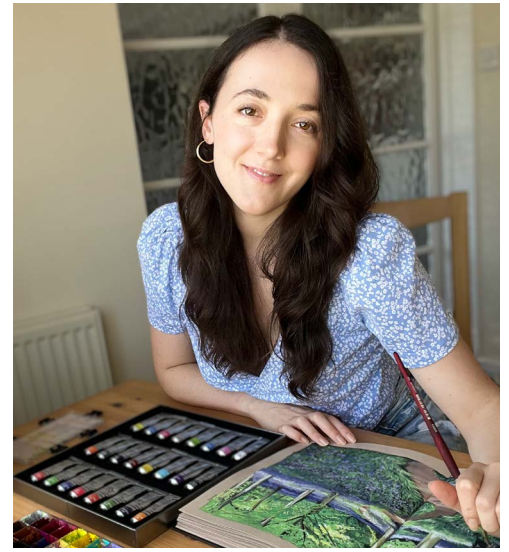
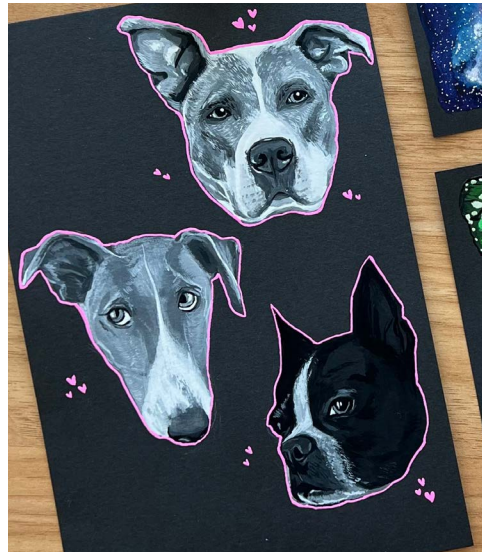
1. Colorful Studies

Nature provides some of the most vibrant and colorful beauties to paint; from flowers, to insects, to birds, just to name a few. I love the magnificent colors you can find in butterflies and painting them on black paper helped accentuate their beautiful color combinations.



2. Galaxies

Black Mixed Media paper is the perfect backdrop for night skies and colorful galaxies. With the black paper there is no need to paint in the sky with black paint; you can just use different shades of colors to layer on to the paper, and finish off with bright white to add in the stars and highlights.



3. Black and White illustrations

Having the black background (or any color toned paper!) to paint on means you can leave it showing through where you need to in your illustration or painting. Exploring monochrome with the black background is very interesting because you have to use the paper as part of your art, versus feeling like you are just painting on the paper. I painted these dog illustrations in black and white and found it to be a really fun challenge to play with the thickness of the white paint in order to allow the paper to show through and create different shades of grey.

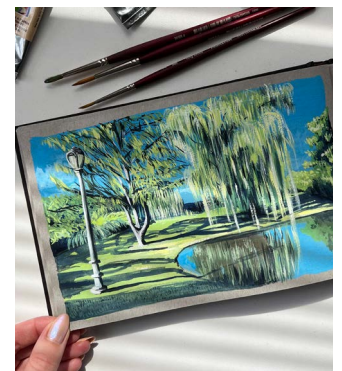

UNDERSTANDING WATERCOLOR PENCILS

What are watercolor pencils?

Watercolor pencils (also known as water-soluble colored pencils) look very similar to traditional colored pencils but are made with a water-soluble binder, which means that when water is added to a dry drawing created with these pencils, the water dissolves the binder to create a watercolor-like paint. This paint can be moved and manipulated with a brush just like traditional watercolor.

There are many benefits to using watercolor pencils, such as intense color saturation, color mixing capabilities, repeated layering, and versatile applications.

Many techniques can be used with watercolor pencils, like color swatching and mixing with a brush on paper, loading your brush directly from the pencils themselves, drawing on wet paper, dipping the pencils in water, and more.

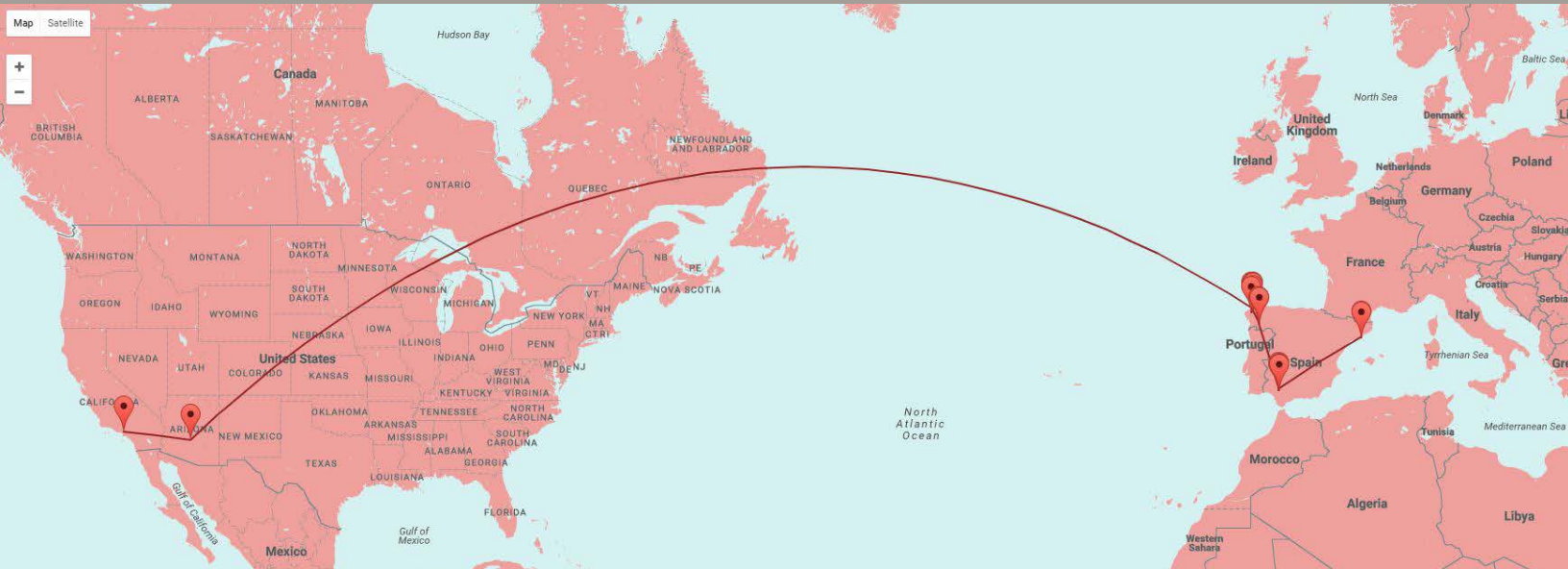

a collaborative art project

In 2015, we sent a Hardbound Mixed Media Art Journal to 12 different artists. Each artist created a page spread and uploaded it to the Pass The Journal website where it got added to a tracking map with a pin mark. Then they passed the book to a different artist of their choosing to continue the cycle. Over the course of the project, the books travelled to 16 countries, 27 US states, and have been in the hands of over 135 different artists.



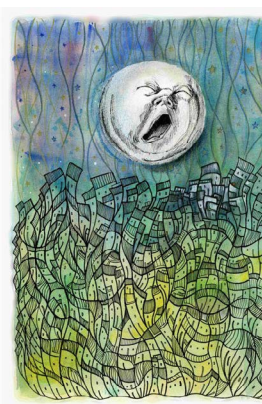
